CORE OF HINDUISM

Brahman---Supreme existence or absolute reality

Avatar-the notion of incarnation

Karma and Samsara---Fatalism and Reincarnation

Nirvana – A state of non-beingness, non-becoming

Moksha - many pathways to heaven, ultimate release from self

Yoga---the union of the human spirit with the divine spirit

KEY ARTICLES OF FAITH

God and goddesses - Brahman and devas (over 330 million gods and goddesses)

Pantheism--- God is in all, material and non-material

Books - Vedas, Upanishads, Bhagwad Gita, Ramayana, Mahabharata

Messengers - Several incarnations of gods and goddesses

Caste System – "Brahmins": the priestly class; "Kshatriyas": warriors and rulers; "Vaisyas": Farmers, merchants & lawyers; "Sudras/dalits": the lowest humans.

End of Days---Pralaya, cyclical destruction of the world

What is Hinduism?

A conglomerate of diverse beliefs and traditions. Grown out of Vedas (perhaps the world's oldest scriptural texts originated in ancient India). Differs from Christianity and other Western religions in that it does not have a single founder, a specific theological system, a single system of morality, or a central religious organization, but it is the world's third largest religion, with about a billion followers worldwide.

Notes:

"I have never yet failed to get a hearing if I talk to [Hindus] about forgiveness of sins and peace and rest in your heart" **Bakht Singh---**India's foremost church planter, pioneer of the Indian church movement.

"Religions are like soups, he said. Some, like consomme, are thin and clear (Unitarianism, Confucianism, modern Judaism); others, like minestrone, are thick and dark (paganism, "mystery religions"). Only Hinduism and Christianity are both "thin" (philosophical) and "thick" (sacramental and mysterious). But Hinduism is really two religions: "thick" for the masses, "thin" for the sages. Only Christianity is both."
